

Whaling

PLACES OF INTEREST

- ⑦ 1 High Street: Sir Samuel Standidge's house. An important figure in the sea trade for Hull, not just in the whaling trade. He died in 1801.
- ⑧ Dikes and King's Yards used to build many vessels involved in whaling.
- ⑨ The Greenland Yards, although not much remains, were the home to the whale processing industry, peaking between 1815 and 1825.
- ⑩ Queen Gardens were once known as the Old Dock (The Dock) where many of the whaling ships were fitted.
- ⑪ Hull Trinity House. Although a "working" building, concerned with the day to day running and administering the Charity (serving seafarers and their families) and Guild, it also contains a wealth of artefacts and memorabilia given by Brethren over the years, very much a museum in its own right.
- ⑫ The 'Truelove' sculpture by artist Stephan Gec, 2002, shows the heads of the two Inuits brought to Hull in the whaler Truelove, based on the casts on display in the Museum.
- ⑬ The Minerva Pub, where many whalers crew members were recruited and agreements signed by many a Captain in later years of the industry.
- ⑭ Memorial/Grave of Capt. John Gravill. He died on board the whaler Diana in Davis Straits 26th December 1866 aged 64 years. He worked in the whale fishery for 40 years.

[Outside the map] There isn't much left, but in low-tide one can glimpse some remnants of the Barkworth and Hawkes shipyards, where the ship Hecla was built (used for Arctic exploration and whaling). Just below the Humber Bridge, in Hessle.
